I wish everyone a happy and healthy 2012 and I look forward to seeing you at our February 13 meet-ing!



We also anticipate a vote on a motion introduced by a resident regarding a change to our Irving Phase II/Arlington Boulevard Beautification Neighborhood-Conservation project. The Phase II project was approved by the AHCA in October of 2010 and is scheduled to move forward this year.

Some residents have concerns regarding the design for the end of S. Hudson Street at Arlington Blvd. This design concern was discussed at length at a twohour special meeting of the AHCA held last month which was open to all residents. We have neighbors who feel quite strongly on both sides of this issue and we encourage all residents to attend the February meeting so they are fully aware of the matter at hand and may vote to support their point of view.

It is important to disclose to all residents that if the proposed change is voted into effect at this meeting it is likely the County, based on their current assessment, will cancel the entire Phase II Beautification project.

The association appreciates hearing the varying viewpoints from Arlington Heights neighbors regarding S. Hudson Street and the Irving Phase II project. We truly appreciate that the discourse has been passionate yet thoughtful and respectful of fellow residents. We may not always see eye to eye on every issue which greets our neighborhood, but we are much stronger as a community when we are able to recognize, appreciate and even celebrate not only those things we have in common but also those things that set us apart.

NEIGHBORHOOD CONSERVATION PROJECT UPDATE



Update on Our Funded Projects

County staff members met with interested residents to discuss the design for the end of South Hudson Street, which is included in Phase II of the Irving Street/Arlington Boulevard project (aka frontage project). The civic association approved the concept design for this project in October 2011. The county continues to work on finalizing the design. After a comprehensive analysis, the county has concluded that the existing design (which narrows the mouth of the street from about 70 feet to the existing street width) is the safest alternative and has declined to support a change in design. Based upon current information, I expect some residents to seek a new vote on this project.

The entire frontage project may be at risk of cancellation if residents who object to narrowing the mouth of Hudson Street seek a vote to cancel the project. Please attend the upcoming meeting on Monday, February 13, 2012 at 7 pm at Patrick Henry Elementary School.

Other Announcements Thank you to Moley Evans for volunteering to serve as the Block Captain for our proposed Fifth Street South Streetlight project!

The Arlington County Traffic Calming Committee has notified the civic association that the 0-100 block of South Hudson Street was selected as one of its 2012 projects. A recent traffic study showed that 3% of vehicles exceed 55 mph on the street, and that the 85th percentile speed is 32 mph. Please note that this initiative is not part of the NC project; the Traffic Calming Committee has its own funding and procedures, which are elaborate and require significant resident support to move forward.

Neighborhood Conservation Funding – The Importance of the 2012 Bond

Funding for the Neighborhood Conservation Program is through local bonds, which are approved by the voters every two years. The County Board will be making crucial decisions about its priorities for the 2012 bond this spring. Neighborhood Conservation has been an important program for this neighborhood, and it has funded significant improvements, especially to our street infrastructure. Over time, these projects have made our community safer and more appealing. As in past years, Neighborhood Conservation will be competing with other programs for funding. NCAC needs a 12 million bond (this funding lasts for 2 years) to continue to operate at its current level. I urge you to support the program. Update on LED Lighting Standards for Residential Streets

In the past year, the Executive Committee of NCAC has worked on a number of issues, including the issue of LED lights. Many throughout Arlington are concerned about the brightness of the new LED lights, which the county plans to retrofit into all existing Carlyle style lights.

I am pleased to report that county staff have now accepted that the lights standards for residential areas needs to be different from that of commercial strips. The new residential standard will permit the dimming of lights, as well as the use of shields in LED lights. Attn: Garfield and Fenwick residents: If your newly installed LED lights are too bright, please contact our new NCA rep Jay Vennett so he can address this issue with the appropriate county staff members.

Northern Virginia Market Trends The Northern Virginia Association of Realtors® reports on March 2011 home sales activity for Fairfax and Arlington counties, the cities of Alexandria, Fairfax and Falls Church and the towns of Vienna, Herndon and Clifton.

A total of 1,437 homes sold in March 2011, a 7.71% decrease below March 2010 home sales of 1,557. Active listings decreased by 7% from 2010, with 3,975 active listings in 3/11, compared with 4,267 homes available in 3/10. The average days on market (DOM) for homes in 3/11 increased 39% to 71 days, compared with 51 days in 3/10. Sale prices rose compared with those realized last year. The average sales price in March 2011 increased 3% from March 2010, to \$448,957 from \$434,129 last March. The median price of homes sold rose in March 2011 to \$385,000, an increase of about 5% compared with March 2010's median price of \$368,000.

The number of new pending home sales in Northern Virginia in March showed a decrease of 5.5% 2,113 compared to 2,236 new contracts pending in March 2010.

Arlington County Statistics comparing March 2010 to 2011: Condos - Avg. Sold Price was \$373,112 in 3/10 - up 13% in 3/11 to \$421,108. Single Family Attached -Avg. Sold Price was \$551,911 in 3/10 - up 18% to \$653,160 in 3/11. Single Family Detached - Avg. Sold Price was \$712,483 in 3/10 – up 3% to \$732,041 in 3/11.

Mortgage Rates are still attractive! The following rates are average quotes with no points: 4.75% to \$417,000, 4.88% up to \$729,750, 5.38% over \$729,750

On 10/1/11 the current administration is *proposing* lowering the conforming loan amount from \$729,750 to \$625,500 for FHA, Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac housing loans.




